

The first book in this hugely popular series is a must read for anyone who enjoys a thriller. Jackson combines fantastic story-telling with a gripping plot making for an outstanding read that is recommended by all who read it.

The Roman Mysteries

This 17-book series about a Roman girl who solves mysteries started when I had a lightbulb moment: Nancy Drew in Ancient Rome! But if 18-year-old Nancy (a fictional girl detective) had lived in Roman times she would be married with about three kids. So, Flavia Gemina is only ten when she solves her first mystery and meets a diverse trio of friends: her Jewish next-door-neighbour Jonathan, shy slave girl Nubia and a feral beggar boy named Lupus who cannot speak but only growls. Over the next few years Flavia, Jonathan, Nubia and Lupus grow up as they solve many mysteries and have adventures all over the empire. With compelling




characters, thrilling plots and conscious accuracy about historical detail, The Roman Mysteries are beloved of teachers, parents and most of all, kids. Ten of the 17 episodes were televised by the BBC in 2007 and 2008. That seems like a long time ago, but ancient Rome is timeless. And so are The Roman Mysteries.

The year is 79 AD. Flavia, Nubia, Jonathan and Lupus are four young friends who live in Ostia and love solving mysteries. They gain a reputation for uncovering plots and putting a stop to villains' plans. Their cases take them from a strange dog-killer in Ostia, to the danger of Pompeii at the eruption of Vesuvius, from hunting down a masked assassin attempting to murder the emperor to gladiator fights in Capua, from the famous Colossus of Rhodes in Greece to the chariot races at Delphi, from trekking along the Nile to the very heart of Rome itself, discovering adventure and romance at every turn. These four intelligent and fearless friends help many people but become embroiled in something larger and more sinister than they ever could have imagined. They end up running from danger, afraid for their lives. Will they ever return to their beloved Ostia and save the ones they love most?

I know that this series is aimed at younger readers but I think that they are enjoyable for all ages. A quick and enjoyable read, they are perfect for anyone who, like myself, enjoys adventure, romance and is interested in the Roman period. I had lots of fun reading this series of 22 books and learned a lot about the Roman era.

Challenge: Join the Thieves' Gambit, a cut-throat competition to crown the world's greatest thief


Rule 1: Never fall in love with your opponent Rule 2: The only thief you can trust is yourself

A British Girl's Guide to Hurricanes and Heartbreak by Laura Taylor Namey

Winchester has always been home for Flora, but when her mother dies, Flora feels untethered. Her family expects her to apply to university and take a larger role in their tea-shop business, but Flora isn't so sure. More than ever, she's the chaotic 'hurricane' in her household, and she doesn't always know how to manage her stormy emotions. So she decides to escape to Miami without telling anyone - especially her longtime friend Gordon Wallace.

But Flora's tropical change of scenery doesn't cast away her self-doubt. When it comes to university, she has no idea which passions she should follow. That's also true in romance. Flora's summer abroad lands her in the flashbulb world of teen influencer Baz Marin, a Miami Cuban who shares her love for photography. But Flora's more conflicted than ever when she begins to see future architect Gordon in a new light.
