GCSE Results 2023



Core subjects achieved the following results at grade 4 or above:

- Mathematics 84% of students attained a grade 4 or above
- English Language 80% of students attained a grade 4 or above
- English Literature 83% of students attained a grade 4 or above
- Science 83% of students attained a grade 4 or above in one or more Science GCSE

A 'broad and balanced' curriculum

- 80% of all GCSE grades achieved were Grades 9-4

Other notable achievements

- Biology 83% of students attained a grade 4 or above
- Chemistry 83% of students attained a grade 4 or above
- Computing 79% of students attained a grade 4 or above
- French 91% of students attained a grade 4 or above
- Music 91% of students attained a grade 4 or above
- Photography 90% of students attained a grade 4 or above
- Physics 85% of students attained a grade 4 or above
- Spanish 88% of students attained a grade 4 or above



Our expectations

- The expectations of behaviour are set out clearly in the Positive Behaviour Policy, which students are expected to follow and apply consistently.






BEHAVIOUR - How will my achievements be rewarded?







Every little helps

An average child can concentrate for 2 to 5 minutes per year of how old they are...

Meaning a single session should be no more than 60 minutes followed by a short break.



- •Top up their **stationary** supply highlighters, post its, pens, cue cards etc.
- Provide snacks and water for revision sessions
- •Be **sensitive**. Allow for 'off days' if they really are getting stressed
- •Keep things in **perspective** they may not work the same way you do. It may be right for them.

Lowers Concentration

Having your phone out while doing homework or revision has been shown to reduce performance by 20%.



Increases FOMO

Fear of Missing Out (FOMO), or the compulsive need to know what others are doing leads to worse moods and increased anxiety.



Increases Stress and Anxiety

Over use of mobile phones leads to increased anxiety, feelings of loneliness and low self-esteem. Reliance on mobile phones can cause irritation, frustration and impatience.



Warps Your liew of Reality

Nobody is as happy as they seem on Facebook or as wise as they appear on Twitter.



Reduces Memory

Instant messages are distracting, which often leads to forgetfulness



Makes You Sleep Worse

Prolonged use of a mobile phone leads to poor sleep quality and duration. The backlight on your phone delays the release of Melatonin, which is a hormone important for sleep.



Mobile Phones in school and out

- NO use of mobiles will be accepted in school.
- Anyone caught with a mobile on the school site should expect for it to be confiscated until the end of the day. Phones are not permitted from 8:30 - 2:40 including break and lunch times.
- If your phone is confiscated, it will be put in an envelope, taken to Reception and locked away. You may collect your phone at the end of the school day.





Online Safety



WhatsApp guidance

- WhatsApp is a hugely popular communication app with approximately 2 billion users across the world.
- The age limit for users in the European Region is 16+ due to data protection laws. The end-to-end encryption also raises a safeguarding concern.
- WhatsApp groups are generally set up to share information, but we are seeing an increase (mainly in younger pupils) misusing these to send <u>malicious communications</u>, whether this is simply being mean or going further to use unpleasant language.



Incidents involving Tech

- Some younger pupils have been caught videoing incidents on their mobile phones, then sharing the footage. This puts them in an unfortunate position regarding privacy and can drag innocent parties into things that they were not originally involved in.
- As per the school 'Anti-Bullying Policy'
- "On social media where it is having an impact on students in school - if issues spill into school then the issue in school will be dealt with, the school cannot deal with social media issue outside of school.
- The school will work closely with external agencies where issues occur over social media which lead to incidents of bullying.



General advice with Christmas fast approaching

- A shared approach to screen time with other parents is often a very powerful tool. There is less chance of a child feeling 'left out' if a group of families agree cut off times for being online or on mobile devices.
- With Christmas coming up, it is advised to do a little bit of research regarding any new games and their age ratings. There are some useful links coming up to support with this.
- It is also worth exploring any hidden costs behind new purchases e.g. subscriptions, sign up costs, added hardware/software required.
