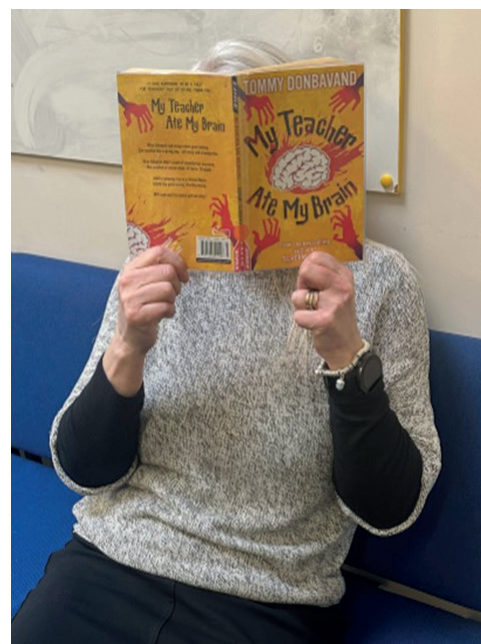
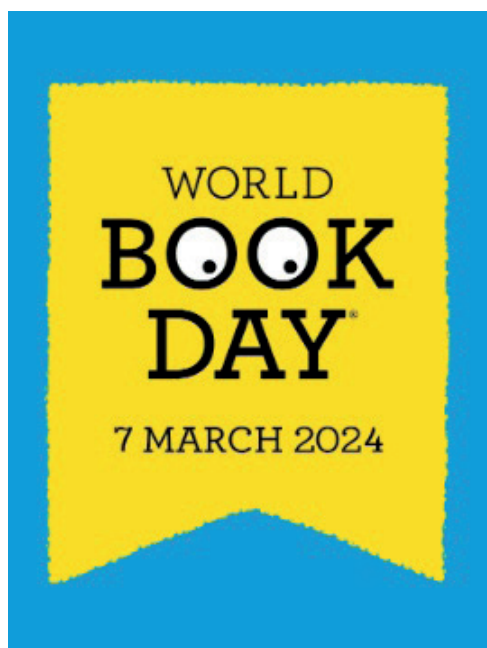

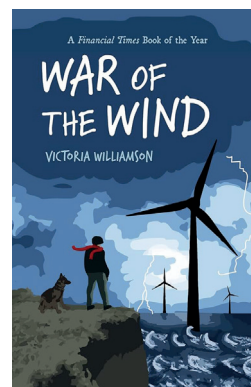
BOOK FAIR!

The Hampshire Book Award 2024

A number of Year 8 students have started taking part in the Hampshire Book Award (HBA) this term. HBA is a prestigious award held annually and is judged solely by Year 8 students across Hampshire. The shortlist of 6 books consists of paperback fiction titles published in the previous year. Past winners include *The Hunger Games*, *Lockwood & Co* and *Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief* - all before they were famous!

This year's shortlist features a ghost story, a city built on stilts, a young boxer from East London and secret government experiments. Students taking part will read all six shortlisted books and attend regular meetings in the library to discuss each book. They will evaluate each book using the criteria in their Judge's Handbook and will finally attend the voting event in July and be one of the students who chooses the HBA 2024 winner.

Ross Welford

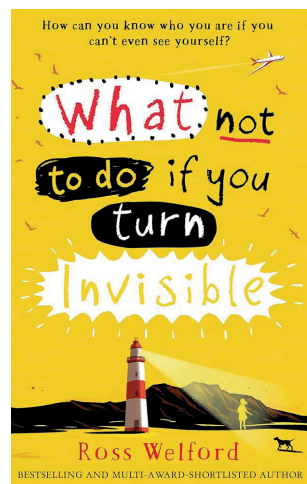
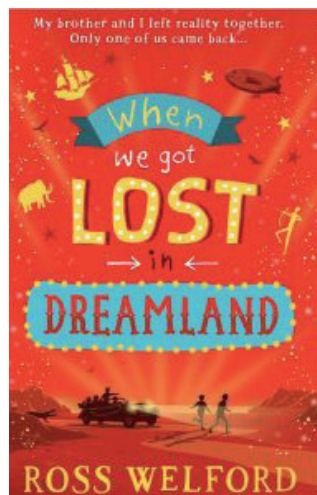
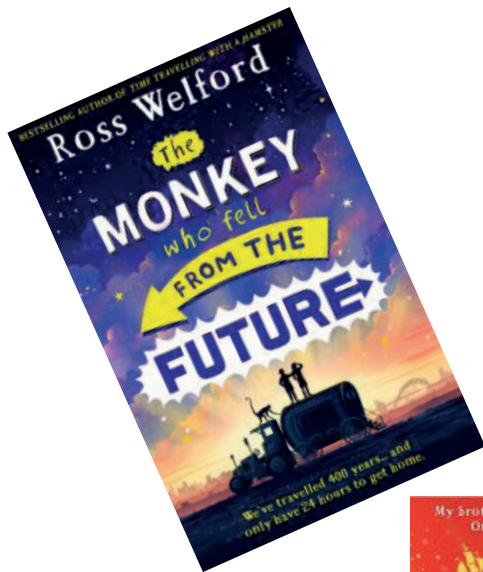
Ross was born in Cullercoats, a small seaside town in the north east of England (it appears in his books as 'Culvercot').

After university, he moved to London and became a journalist and then, after a few years, a television producer.

He worked on many well-known shows, including ITV's This Morning with Richard Madeley and Judy Finnegan; Channel 4's Big Breakfast and the long-running Pet Rescue.

He began writing Time Travelling With A Hamster in 2014. It was published in January 2016 and was shortlisted for the Costa, Blue Peter, Waterstones and Branford Boase Awards. His second book, What Not To Do If You Turn Invisible followed a year later. His most recent book, Time Travelling With A Tortoise, was released ten years after the release of his first book.

He lives in London with his family, tropical fish and border collie, Jess.

Murder at Twilight by Fleur Hitchcock

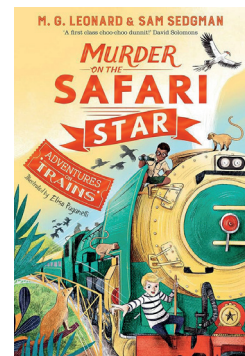
